- Using SKYPE, Twitter, blogs, and Facebook in the religious studies classroom. What strategies may be used to incorporate new technologies into the classroom and in student mentoring?

- For a possible cosponsored session with the Native Traditions in the Americas Group, teaching native traditions in the undergraduate introductory/survey course. What are the issues?

In addition, we invite proposals for a cosponsored luncheon session with the <u>Wabash Center</u> for Teaching and Learning in Theology and Religion

. The proposal should identify a teaching strategy or topic to facilitate a small group lunch discussion with fellow teachers interested in your topic. Finally, we invite other papers and panels on innovative teaching practices grounded in the scholarship of teaching and learning.
